<u>"BIG WAR OVER- GERMANY SIGNS ARMISTICE"-</u> Well, that is the way the headline read in the Rockingham Post-Dispatch on November 11, 1918. Newspapers across the country and around the world echoed similar expressions of relief and peace as the "War to end all wars" came to an end. Please join us on Monday October 15th at 7pm as we welcome Mark Molesky, PhD- our Fall meeting speaker. Dr. Molesky is a Professor of History at Seton Hall University. He received his BA from



the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor and his MA and PhD in history from Harvard University. He studies a wide range of subjects in modern and early modern European history, which include the Lisbon Earthquake of 1755, the European and American Enlightenments, environmental history, the history of Franco-

American relations, the Holocaust, and World War I and II. His most recent book, *This Gulf of Fire: The Destruction of Lisbon, or Apocalypse in the Age of Science and Reason* (Knopf, 2015), was awarded the 2016 Phi Alpha Theta Book Award and was a finalist for the Los Angeles Times Book Prize.

<u>POP QUIZ: WHERE IS PEA PATCH ISLAND AND WHY SHOULD I CARE? –</u> Ok. So..... do you know or do you give up? It is a small island approximately 1 mile long, located mid-channel in the Delaware River near the entrance to Delaware Bay. It is a low marshy island. It might have remained nondescript, but it was noticed by Pierre L'Enfant (Revolutionary War military engineer and planner of Washington, D.C.). He thought it would be a great spot to place a fort to help defend Newcastle, Delaware and Philadelphia. Following his recommendation, the U.S. Government sought to take control of the island. However, there was one obstacle in the way.

It seemed Dr. Henry Gale, a resident of New Jersey claimed ownership of the island under deed from the state of New Jersey. He used the island as a private hunting ground. The military offered him \$30,000 for the

island but he refused. Not willing to go away quietly, the military appealed to the state of Delaware. The state claimed ownership of the entire Delaware River and all islands, within a twelve mile circle around New Castle's Court House. The Delaware state legislature passed an act in May of 1813 which ceded the island to the United States Government. It was not long before the government seized it from Dr. Gale. Because ownership of the island




was a matter of dispute going forward, in 1820, Secretary of War John C. Calhoun requested a legal opinion from the Attorney General of the U.S.. After reviewing several reports on the matter, Attorney General William Wirt's conclusion was that the state of Delaware had the valid claim to the island, and so New Jersey could not have properly deeded it to Dr. Gale.

During the War of 1812, the government made efforts to fortify Pea Patch Island. The plan of defense was coordinated by Capt. Samuel Babcock, who was also working on similar defenses up the river in Philadelphia. A seawall and dykes were built around the island, but there is no evidence that an actual fortification was constructed during the war. There is mention of progress on a fort on the "Pea Patch in Delaware River" by Chief Engineer Joseph Gardner Swift on December 8, 1817.

The attack on Fort Mifflin during the Revolutionary War made it evident that a fort was needed further away from Philadelphia in order to delay possible invaders. A fort located closer to the mouth of t river would also provide protection for vital port cities such as Marcus Hook, Wilmington, Chester, and New Castle. In February of 1821, the Board of Engineers reported that the fort on Pea Patch Island and one on the Delaware shore, opposite, "defend the water passage as far below Philadelphia as localities will permit." They noted that these forts will force the enemy to land forty miles below the city to attack it by land. This would allow time for the city to prepare for attack. It is be-

lieved that Fort Delaware was erected on the site after the end of the War of 1812. That wooden structure was replaced by another version .

The star fort was designed by army engineer Joseph G. Totten and construction was initially supervised by Capt. Samuel Babcock. Construction was delayed years past the projected date due to uneven settling, improper pile placement, and the island's marshy nature. At one point, an entire section of 43,000 bricks had to be taken down, cleaned and reworked due to massive cracking. Captain Babcock was severely criticized for altering Totten's plans without orders. He was subsequently ordered to appear before a courts martial in late 1824. It was determined that he was not guilty of neglect, but only of poor judgment, and he was acquitted.



In our next installment, we will cover the changes to Fort Delaware and its utilization during the Civil War. This fort still exists and is a hidden gem in the middle of the Delaware River. Stay tuned for more !!
