<u>APRIL 2023 HISTORICAL SOCIETY MEETING</u> On April 17th, heard from Col. Don Carey. Col. Carey has a 45 year banking and investment career with Merrill Lynch, PNB Bank and Federated Investors. Concurrently he has had a 37 year career in the USMC as an artillery officer. Formerly of Haddonfield, Don resides in Ship Bottom with his wife Fran, the former principal of Atlantic Avenue & Seventh Avenue Schools. As a lecturer, he has given presentations on Military history and battlefield strategy, famous court martials and the Battle of Gettysburg.

The presentation included a perspective on how famine and economics has impacted the history of the world. His message also contained a cautionary tale about how history repeats itself, and that factors like global warming can also contribute to changes in history.



HADDON HEIGHTS REMEMBERED ... CAPTIONS FROM THE IDEAL SUBURB- As

you may know, the Historical Society published a book titled "The Ideal Suburb- Haddon Heights Remembered". It was first printed in 1990, and updated with a second edition in 2006, reflecting activities from our town centennial in 2004. You can still find this book. I recently bought one at a local estate sale and gave it

to one of my new neighbors so they would know more about the history of our town. I thought I would share with you a few pieces of our history. The first property is currently a subject of controversy as the new owners, intend to demolish it and the adjacent structure on Station Ave (501 & 503) under the recently enacted town Redevelopment Program. Their plan is to put up a multi-use building with retail and office space on the ground floor, and apartments on the upper 2 floors.

The house on the S.E. Corner of White Horse Pike and



Station Ave (former AT&T store)- This location was the site of the first Butcher Shop in Haddon Heights. Mr. Benjamin Crookes was a Scottish immigrant who owned land along the White Horse Pike and Station Avenue, and wanted nothing to do with retail trade. He believed that gentlemen do wholesale business... He owned a ship's



Chandlery company which provisioned many of the ships in the port of Philadelphia. His wife had grown up in the Germantown section of the city and was the daughter of the largest glove importer in Phila. His business was located in the building next to Strawbridge & Clothier in downtown Phila.

After moving to Haddon Heights, so Mr. Crookes could be closer to his business, he provided meats for his family, and commuted daily to Philadelphia. Mrs. Crookes said that there was not a butcher shop in Haddon Heights, and his company dealt in meats for ships, so she thought it would be natural for him to open the first butcher shop in

town in the front of their building. Mr. Crookes relented and hired a butcher.

That first butcher shop was located next to the corner of Station Ave. and the White Horse Pike in 1902. The business quickly outgrew the small frame building, and Mr. Crookes moved the business to a larger building on the corner property. The original frame building, after being vacated by the butcher shop, became the town's first barber shop, run by Ulysses G. Ford. A few years later, Mr. Ford gave up the barber shop and became the town's first Constable.

Around 1907, Mr. Crookes built a house for his wife and family on the White Horse Pike, nxt to the corner where the Butcher Shop was established. While we're at it, did you know that Station Avenue was once home to a movie theater? It was built and opened in January 1914 by Benjamin Crookes . He hired Charley Runkle, a local resident, storyteller, and advertising representative for the Reading Railroad, to run the theater. Mr. Crookes died in October, 1914, just ten months after opening the theater. Mrs. Crookes continued to operate the theater for several more years before renting it to the Hunt Theater interests.

The second property I would like to feature, is the 1st Public School in Haddon Heights. C- 1900. It had four class-



rooms and was located on King's highway at the railroad. This building accommodated eight grades in its four rooms. There were two teachers and a principal Mr. Rogers. The school children called the principal "Gumshoe" Rogers, because of the rubber soled shoes he wore, allowing him to be able to "creep" around the school.
